HEALTHCARE

Healthcare- the heartbeat of our organisation. We continue to prioritise providing high-quality, affordable healthcare to migrant workers in need. Our 3 clinics in Geylang, Jurong, and Mandai served over 3500 unique patients in 2016, many of whom return for follow-up consultations.





CASEWORK

Our caseworkers support migrant workers suffering from work injuries, unpaid salaries, and other disputes with their employers. We journey with them every step of the way - from reporting their work injury, accompanying them on hospital appointments, liaising with MOM, ICA, and their employers on their behalf to providing a sympathetic ear, caring for their mental health, and sending them off at the airport after they receive their compensation. In 2016 we assisted 488 injured workers and 233 workers on non-injury related disputes.





ZHANG

Zhang (name & photo changed) is a migrant worker from Henan, China. Zhang suffered a serious injury due to a workplace accident and was unable to work. His employer disputed his injury and refused to pay him any MC wages. He turned to HealthServe for help. In addition to providing Zhang with social assistance, our case workers helped Zhang fight for his medical leave and MC wages, write to MOM, and to ultimately get his full injury compensation. Through this period, we also provided Zhang with emotional support and counselling. Before boarding his flight home, Zhang wrote, "After I was injured, I felt both physical pain and emotional pain. The brothers and sisters at HealthServe, with their patient help and support, lifted my spirits. The emotional pain has gone away."

MONIR

Monir (name and photo changed), from Bangladesh, fell at the worksite and injured his spine. His employer refused to bring him to a hospital even though he suffered debilitating pain. Monir went to the hospital on his own. Though the hospital doctor noted that an MRI was necessary, his employer refused to pay for the procedure. Instead, the employer cancelled Monir's work permit, and attempted to repatriate him by enlisting thugs to "accompany" him to the airport. At the airport, Monir approached ICA officers for help. HealthServe assisted Monir with medical care, social assistance, and helped mediate with MOM and his employer for fair treatment. Monir was able to get an MRI and is currently awaiting his injury compensation.



SOCIAL ASSISTANCE

Our social assistance programs are designed as short-term relief programs for needy workers who cannot afford basic necessities such as food, transport, medical care and housing. We have two food programmes - one in Geylang and a second in Little India - as well as two emergency shelters.



BROTHERS SERVING BROTHERS Concerned over the high rates of high blood pressure and cholesterol among injured migrant workers, a volunteer came up with a new idea: what if we served a home cooked meal, made with less salt and oil, chock full of vegetables, as a part of our food programme? Thus started our Wednesday lunch programme at Desker, homemade with love by volunteer injured workers, for injured workers.

EVENTS & OUTINGS


Waiting for the outcome of their case is an emotionally trying time for migrant workers. Many fall into depression over their uncertain future and inability to provide for their families. Individuals and groups come alongside HealthServe to plan outings and events for these injured workers in order to build community and help take their minds off their situation. In 2016, over 50 events were planned by nearly 1,000 volunteers.



RAISING AWARENESS

HealthServe envisions a day when our services will no longer be needed - a day when every migrant worker is free to live and work with dignity and equity. We believe that one way to realise this vision is to spread awareness about the multi-faceted reality of migrant workers in Singapore - their contributions, struggles, and achievements. We do this by giving talks at schools and hospitals, running a selective course through NUS medical school, expanding our volunteer base, and organising large awareness events annually.




